sexually exploited.

Dear Scarlet Road Community,

When I reflect on how many lives have been impacted by your generous support, it amazes me! Scarlet Road has grown by leaps and bounds in the number of survivors served and in the breadth of services offered. In 2023, we had the profound honor of providing critical services to

survivors – more than ever before.

During the first month of 2023, **Scarlet Road took a groundbreaking step**, addressing a huge gap in our community. We expanded access to our Aftercare recovery services, which in the past were available only to female survivors, to now be available to all survivors in our region!

We also took time to evaluate the effectiveness of our programs and create adaptations to ensure the best possible care and outcomes for all. As a result, we expanded our life skills group offerings

for survivors, entered the planning phase for beginning a survivor advisory board, and increased supports for our incredible staff.

As we serve children and adults who are courageously leaving entire networks of violence and control, we are vividly aware that the need for a safe place that understands the deep wounds of exploitation has never been more pressing.

Your partnership brings vital encouragement to our staff and volunteer team, and life changing hope to survivors. Thank you for believing a vibrant life of freedom is possible for everyone!

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PREVENT

Scarlet Road leads our UnBroken prevention training in local middle and high schools, equipping youth to recognize, avoid, and safely report sexual exploitation.

Our specialized training for first responders and community service providers leads to prevention and early identification of victims.



REACH

Through our crisis line, drop-in center, and community referrals, Scarlet Road connects with survivors of sex trafficking.

Outreach advocates journey alongside survivors, delivering crisis services and resources to exit exploitation safely.



RESTORE

Our long-term wraparound Aftercare program empowers survivors to rebuild lives of their own design.

Through individualized case management and life skills groups, survivors find freedom from exploitation, stable housing, community, and self-sufficiency.




Empowering Youth

SIANNA'S JOURNEY

After hearing a Scarlet
Road advocate speak in her
classroom, Sianna called
our hotline. She shared that
when she was 14 years old,
she had been coerced into
sexual exploitation by three
adults. After the situation
ended, she never told anyone,
leaving her vulnerable to
future exploitation.

After the advocate helped her file a report with law enforcement, Sianna agreed to talk with her grandmother and school counselor. A week later, Sianna shared that she had not experienced the blame she feared. "My grandma said, 'I'm just sorry you felt scared to talk with me. I'm always on your team!"

Sianna emerged with new confidence that she can find help from supportive family and friends, and she doesn't ever have to repeat the painful experience of exploitation.

Because the average age of entry into trafficking in our community is just 15 years old, Scarlet Road partners with schools, juvenile detention, and youth centers. From interactive prevention training, to crisis response, to long-term recovery support, we walk alongside youth every step of the way.

Reaching Incarcerated Survivors

When a victim of sex trafficking is incarcerated, they are often told by their abusers that their only option after release is to return to the dehumanizing pain of "the life".

What if we could identify victims of sex trafficking experiencing incarceration while they are separated from their traffickers and buyers?

What if we could meet in person, hear their stories, interrupt the cycle of violence, and empower them to pursue freedom and safety after release?

To answer these questions, Scarlet Road created a traumainformed screening survey that is now offered in Kitsap County Jail and juvenile detention. When a survivor is identified, we provide on-site advocacy and reentry support. Empowered through connection and knowledge, incarcerated survivors are changing their trajectories.

ELIJAH'S JOURNEY

Standing at the kiosk in the county jail, Elijah slowly read the questions. Each one brought him a scene from his childhood. "This was my life from age 8-15," he scrawled on the bottom of the page.

When a Scarlet Road advocate met with Elijah in person, he shared, "I don't feel safe when I'm not in jail. I've been numbing all this pain with drugs, but filling out those questions made me realize I've got to tell somebody what happened." With the advocate's support, he made his own plan for his upcoming release.

After Elijah successfully completed substance abuse treatment, he reached out to let us know he was settled in safe housing and was accessing recovery support through his tribe. Telling his story had given Elijah the courage to change his life.



Safety through Housing

After leaving a situation of sexual exploitation, **survivors face a myriad of barriers to safe housing:** lack of rental history, missing identity documents, criminal charges, or insufficient resources to cover move-in costs.

Scarlet Road's wraparound housing support empowers survivors facing homelessness to secure or remain in housing through case management, survivor-designed finance classes, and flexible rental assistance. Through our network of local landlords, Scarlet Road connects participants to stable housing at below market value.

This model works. Survivors and their children are able to pursue recovery and self-sufficiency in the neighborhoods they choose.

ISABELLA'S JOURNEY

Staying in a local shelter with only her purse and the clothes on her back, Isabella became increasingly uneasy. This seemed like a place her well-connected trafficker would find her and force her back into the violence of sexual exploitation. After her shelter advocate connected her with Scarlet Road, our team placed Isabella in safe, affordable housing and covered initial rental costs through flexible rental assistance funds.

With her basic needs met, Isabella found the courage to seek treatment for a life threatening medical condition and began reuniting with her family. Her quiet strength is evident in every friendship she makes and every poem she writes.





Community Partnerships

MEDICAL CARE

Trauma-informed medical care at no cost to the patient through a local clinic

MENTAL HEALTH

Licensed therapy and animal-assisted therapy specialized for exploitation survivors at reduced rates

HOUSING

Immediate safe housing through local shelters and safe hotel stays

Long-term housing referrals through partnerships with local landlords

SUBSTANCE USE TREATMENT

Referrals to residential and nonresidential recovery programs

CLOTHING

Shopping for quality clothing at no cost through a partnership with a local consignment store

EMPLOYMENT

Employment training and connections to job and internship opportunities

LEGAL ADVOCACY

Assistance navigating the legal system, obtaining protection orders, and resolving past criminal charges

- Designed and implemented traumainformed screening to identify survivors in places of incarceration

- Expanded access to wraparound Aftercare services from females only to all survivors

- Achieve capacity to provide Aftercare services to 100% more survivors than in 2021



- Expand partnerships with BIPOC communities and translate outreach materials into 7 languages



At Scarlet Road, we are humbled by the generosity of our community and steward our resources within a framework of sustainability and integrity.


Scarlet Road upholds the highest standards of financial transparency and participates in an external audit annually.
